
# Autumn 2024

Here are some book reviews from some of our amazing children.


# **Happy Reading!**















### Me, My dad and the end of the rainbow by Benjamin Dean

A struggle for survival in The Great Fire of London, 1666



A moving adventure about the impact of plastic pollution on our seas, and the campaigning power of friendship






